






## Special Report: Hobie Midwinter Regattas

#### An In Depth Observation The Hobie Public Image

The 1972 Hobie Worlds Championship Hobie Regatta was history with the last boat crossing the finish line off of Diamond Head, Honolulu, Hawaii. However, to quote one of the original Hobie skippers. Wayne Schafer, "This is really only the beginning." Wayne's foresight is as good as his seamanship. The Hobie has arrived and has brought the catamaran concept to the inner circle of yachting. The crucible of tradition bound corinthians harboring deep draft displacment versus planing hull theories have been partially opened by the advent of Buccaneer and Windward Passage in the larger boat fleets and the International 14, and a number of subsequently planing hull dinghies in the smaller one design fleets.

The publicity of the Worlds event for news sake is past. What is appearing in the mail daily from publications around the country and overseas is a broadside of feature stories, led off by Sailboat Week well written story and pictures by Paul Powers and now full color magazine articles are ready to break on the colorful fast Hobie Cat and its impact on the yachting scene. All say the same thing: there is another way to go. "On the water", not in it. Go faster than the wind; man has strived for years to break this barrier. The Hobie Cat does it naturally. No rudder wiggling or weight shifting as in a planing monohull dinghy to "get it up" on the water. The Hobie is already there, offering only minimum hull resistance with any amount of wind. We in the Hobie gang have known this all along. The rest are just now finding it out. Maybe it took the Worlds Championship to bring it out.

One instant example of the coming of age of the catamaran concept was the inclusion of all catamaran classes into the Hawaiian Yacht Racing Associations first regatta of the 1973 season, one week after the Worlds. Unfortunately, the Trades were gusting to 30 knots with small craft warnings flying and class boats could not compete, but this was a break in the general attitude as a direct result of the tremendous barrage of The Worlds Championship publicity.


How can we as Hobie skippers keep this wonderful momentum moving towards a full acceptance of the catamaran in general and the Hobie Cat in particular into the total vachting community? By improving our public image. Due to the wreckless or careless boat handling on the part of a few hot doggers or inexperienced skippers. The total Hobie image has a lot to be desired. It now becomes necessary for all Hobie skippers to go out of their way, to overcome the poor image created by the one bad apple in the barrel.

A Hobie Cat is a lethal weapon if improperly handled, especially in close quarters, narrow channels, near swimmers, yacht anchorages and vessels underway. A Hobie rudder at 10 to 15 knots can severely injure a swimmer. A Hobie bow is like a battering ram anc can penetrate almost any wood or fiberglass hull at that same speed, unfortunately at the water line. It's easy to see why more and more Harbor Departments are issuing citations to wreckless and speeding Hobies.

Let's all endeavor to go beyond the rules of the road in congested waterways and give way to approaching power boats who have a difficult time maneuvering in tight quarters to larger sailboats even though we are holding the right of way. If you do have a decisive slant and cross their bows, give a wave or a shout as a thank you. Show a positive course when approaching another vessel head on; don't make him guess what your course is going to be. Hobie fleets should try to educate new boat owners in the art of maneuvering their boats in crowded areas. Everyone should chastize the wreckless skipper; he's spoiling it for everyone.

In open water have a ball, fly a hull or sail on screaming reach and no one will suffer for any mistakes in judgment or excessive speed. But in congested areas use common sense and common courtesy. Let's make the 1973 season a real carefree fun Hobie year for "everyone" in the yachting fraternity and watch the Hobie public image grow

#### **Denis Wilcox**

### **Champions Corner**

Denis Wilcox has sailed something since he was 12 years of age. His family lived in Newport Harbor, on Lido Isle in California where he became familiar with sailing on dinghies that his family owned. His first boat was an 8' Dinkkitten. He entered a few races at that age and did well on heavy weather days.

Denis first sailed a Hobie 14 after the 1971 Miami, Florida Boat Show and has been hooked on Hobies ever since. He has restricted his racing to 14s since he weighed in at 155 lbs.

Denis feels his best point of sailing is going to weather and reaching. He feels the most important points of boat tuning are: mast rake, shroud tension, batten tension and shape and rudder alignment and smoothness.

Denis and his family live on a lake in central Florida. When he's not running his tropical fish business he likes to get out on the water and practice sailing in shifting air, which he believes is helpful in trying to understand similar conditions during races. He also makes trips to the gulf and the Atlantic coast as often as possible to get the feel of choppy water. Denis was a contestant to the 1972 Worlds Championship in Honolulu, having qualified by placing fifth in the 1972 Hobie 14 Nationals at Surfside, Texas, and he enjoyed the heavy seas off of Waikiki experienced during the Worlds. Denis performed well during the 1972 World's Championships being the first mainland skipper outside of California to place, finishing 7th, with a 2nd, two fourths, a sixth, two sevenths, two elevenths, a fifteenth and a seventeenth. Denis had a good rooting section during the 1972 World's Championship having been accompanied to the Worlds by his wife and two daughters.

Denis makes all of the adjustments necessary and then when the boat is 100% tuned, he feels that the rest is up to him to sail a perfect race. A good start, clean air, watchboat trim, cover your opponents, sail as much as you can with your best competition, learn from your opponents, know what they know and add that to what you know, and don't repeat your mistakes.

Denis admits that occasionally a course lay-out bothers him, especially in strange water. If there is not sufficient time to get out and take some shore bearings on course buoys before the race, he will try to imprint the general lay of the course on his mind during the first race while trying to place as high as possible.

If Denis is as precise and meticulous with his wholesale tropical fish business as he is with the trim and tuning detail of a Hobie Cat, he

#### MIDWINTERS EAST—Apollo Beach, Florida—March 3 & 4, 1973

One hundred forty-six Hobie 14s and 16s made the early spring migration south to the sun out of the snow from New York, New Jersey, Michigan, Vermont, New Hampshire, Virginia and points north. They found what they came for: beautiful warm Florida spring weather, enough wind to make a Hobie go and an enjoyable time.

Apollo Beach has gained a lot of popularity with the Hobie fleet nation-wide having been the site of the 1971 Hobie Cat 14 Championships and a number of area and regional qualifying regattas. The location is well liked for its support facilities; the Apollo Beach Holiday Inn is the focal point for all activities and offers a beach side convenience to Hobie skippers that is not easy to find. Vans, campers and motor home parking is permitted on the adjacent vacant lots for skippers that bring their own accommodations. A large dining room and quaint bar serves the food and drink needs perfectly.

Sunday's two races were held in a ten to fifteen knot breeze that gave some single trapeze work for 16 crews and some gut muscle exercise for the 14 skippers.





#### 1973 Championship Regattas

We are rapidly approaching the 1973 sailing season and are finalizing plans for this years major regatta. A few changes are being made which we would like to explain now so everyone understands the system.

Most of you know that the country is divided into thirteen regions for the purpose of mailing information and organizational purposes. Each year we have had regional championships as a means of getting all skippers of the area together and as a method of qualifying for the Nationals.

This year the method of qualifying for the Nationals has been modified slightly. We will again have the regional championship retatta and will qualify the top Hobie 14 and top Hobie 16 skipper from each region directly into the A-Fleet at the respective Nationals. The regionals will be held sometime in late June or early July.

Following the regionals will be a "district" championship. There will be four district championships; the east, south, midwest and west. Refer to the map to see which district you are in. The district championships will be held in August and will be sponsored by Coast Catamaran on a scale approaching a national championship. The top six skipper in Hobie 14 and Hobie 16 will qualify for the A-Fleets. We are trying to select sites which are central to each district so that everyone has an equal chance to attend.


Hawaii and the West Indies will each qualify skippers for the A-Fleets from their regional championship regattas because of the inconvenience and expense they would have to incur to participate in a district championship. Hawaii will qualify three skippers into each National A-Fleet and Division 13 (the Caribbean, Bahamas and West Indies) will qualify two.

The 1972 National champion will automatically qualify for the A-Fleet making a total of 41 pre-qualified skippers going into the Nationals. That leaves 9 spots to be filled by a qualifying series immediately preceding the Nationals. All skippers who do not qualify to sail in the A-Fleet will compete in the B-Fleet.

The National championships are going to be in the early fall—sometime from mid-September to early October. Plans are to hold the Hobie 16 Nationals in the east and the Hobie 14 Nationals in the West.

As soon as we have information on exact locations and dates for each of these major regattas, we will let you know so you can make your plans. We expect to be able to announce our preliminary plans and further details in next month's Hotline Keith Fuller, Race Coordinator



#### Midwinters West Guaymas, Mexico—February 17 & 18

The first Hobie regatta of the 1973 continental US season, the Midwinters West was held at San Carlos, Mexico on the Mike Nichols "Catch 22" movie location site. This was the third year for this popular event at this location. Ask anyone that made the scene, it gets better each year. The water is warmer, the sky is bluer, and the air is clearer, natives are friendlier and most of all this year there was plenty of wind before and during the regatta.

Many contestants and wives arrived early and enjoyed carefree days of fun races, land sailing, seeing the sights and sounds of this central Mexican coastal area. San Carlos, the resort area near the regatta site has become the retirement and winter vacation mecca for many Americans. Each year groups come out to the Catch 22 site and join in the Hobie fun. Volunteers for committee work were plentiful and they thoroughly enjoyed the excitement and color of the eighty some colorful Hobies flying around the blue water of the Sea of Cortez. This livens up for them what probably becomes a pretty boring but pleasant winter retreat. Large parties of retirees and vacationers enjoy the shrimp and fish fry held on Saturday evening. Fun races with Le Mans starts and finishes using offshore islands for marks made exciting days during the week prior to the regatta. The wind for two days blew so hard that the bay was abandoned and land sailors were put to use. Racing around set marks against the clock, the 5,000 foot runway constructed for the movie "Catch 22" made a nice reach up towards the mountain, around a beer can and back to the beach starting line, flying wheels instead of flying hulls, a few capsizes at 30 MPH, but no injuries. This site lacks all of the amenities expected for a Hobie regatta site. No water, electricity, beachside restaurants, hotel rooms, etc. What it lacks in these areas, it more than makes up for in general appeal for the Hobie racing set.

Campers, vans, vacation trailers, tents and just plain sleeping bags on the sand is the thing. Excellent motel accommodations are available in San Carlos, six miles along the coast or twelve miles to the modern city of Guaymas, offering all of the accommodations and conveniences necessary to support a seaport community of over 70,000 population.

Water was delivered daily in five-gallon glass jugs, deluxe toilet facilities were prepared by the staff of the Hobie Newport office.

By Friday evening everyone had arrived and were ready for a great regatta with eighty-three boats and contestants from as far away as Colorado and Michigan filling out all of the classes for the starting line-up Saturday. Winds were moderate to strong for the first race, but picked up in the afternoon to blow 18 to 20 MPH. After a long second race involving many capsizes and a dismasting, the committee decided to call off the third race of the day, a decision no one objected to. This gave the skippers and crews time to relax and enjoy a Mexican refreshment before the Guaymas shrimp, fish and Mexican feed.

The regular mariachi band plus three new members gave a great concert before, during and after the dinner and was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. Sunday started off with a bang about 4:00 a.m., the line at the prepared toilet facilities was abandoned for just any spot in the brush. And again Montezuma had his revenge.

The committee had a difficult decision to make, whether to lay out the days course near the beach in case of emergencies or hang a roll of "t.p." on each mark.


By noon the crisis had passed and two more races were held in good Hobie double trapeze wind and a smooth sparkling sea.

The awards included foil trophies and GI barracks caps inscribed with the name of the event and the place winner.

By 8:00 a.m. Monday morning almost all of the fleet of campers, vans, Hobies, land sailors, trailers and tents had folded and stolen away to leave this deserted stretch of beautiful beach and sea until I am sure, another Hobie Midwinter Regatta next year.

# SENIORS OLYMPIC YACHTING COMPETITION

Plans are in the formulating stage for the First Seniors Olympic Yachting Competition to be held in Long Beach Harbor July 28-29. This regatta will precede the opening regatta of the Long Beach Sea Festival by one week. This should make a great Hobie ten days for a Hobie family vacation and is the reason for this early announcement, so that vacations can be requested around these dates.

The Seniors Olympic Sports International will be enjoying their fourth year of competition this year. This event has grown by leaps and bounds in the sports world to include track, field, bicycling, wrestling, badminton, tennis, winter sports, swimming, diving, sculls, gymnastics and 30 like competitive team and individual sports.

This will be the first year for a sailing event and your committee has cornered it for the Hobie 14s or 16s. Competition is open to anyone male of female 25 or older who owns a Hobie or who can arrange the use of a boat for this weekend.

As in all Senior Olympics scoring is based on five to ten year age groups depending on the event and in the case of the sailing event, the number of entries in each age group.

Trophies will be awarded on this basis in both mens and womens division. There will be a common start and scoring will be based on finishing orders for each age group, and each size Hobie.

This promises to be a fun event for the over 25 enthusiast with the kids sitting out this one while Dad has his go with the family boat.

Over 3,000 contestants entered the 1972 Senior Olympic games, coming from almost all of the 50 states and six foreign countries. Age is no barrier to competition in any event with contestants over 60 years old competing in the marathon, Buster Crabbe of Tarzan fame comes out from his home in New York to compete in swimming events at the age of 65. Launching for the sailing event will take place at Bay Sailing, Appian Way at Bayshore, Belmont Shores or the foot of Cherry Avenue, Long Beach. The series will consist of two races each day back to back with the location of the trophy awards to be announced at a later date. In addition to Olympic trophies, trophies will be awarded to the contestant travelling the greatest distance. The oldest contestant and a Senior's Olympics perpetual trophy for first over all.

Delegates for the 1973 Senior Olympics Sailing event are popular senior Hobie enthusiasts and 14 skippers from Southern California: Dr. John Ross-Duggan, Everett Baggs, and Dan Tubbs.


