Starting a Hobie Fleet

The Hobie Cat Class Association was started by a group of Hobie owners who got together back in 1968 to organize some racing and activities. Hobie was the mainstay of the group promoting the activities himself. At this time, it wasn't really a Class Association but simply a group of owners wanting to have fun with their new toys. Hobie would write brief newsletters from the factory announcing regattas as they developed across the country. He published a set of Class Rules rigidly restricting changes and modifications which can be made to the boat. As the Class started to grow, people were hired to help administer the program and keep things somewhat organized. At that point, the association became a little more formal; the ground work for the establishment for fleets was developed and the Hobie Cat Hot Line was initiated as a class newsletter.

The Class Association was originally organized around one basic consideration: to extend each Hobie owner's enjoyment through organized, family-oriented activities. Innovations were made in racing procedures and the regatta structures. A policy of including the whole family in the activities developed to assure everyone would have fun at a Hobie Cat regatta. The Association continually strives to develop better programs so owners may further enjoy their Hobie Cats. It also rigidly maintains the one-design nature of the Hobie Cat Class trying to keep all boats as equal as possible so that everyone has an equal chance at winning.

The fleet network has been growing by leaps and bounds. We are constantly receiving inquiries about fleets in areas where there are none. Therefore we are encouraging owners to form new fleets where activity is lacking. Through a local fleet, each owner can frequently participate in Hobie Cat activities in his own back yard. Organized fleets can provide you with countless hours of activity and a chance to meet new friends while enjoying the Hobie way of life.

WHY FORM A HOBIE CAT FLEET

You, as a Hobie Cat owner, bought your boat with one thing in

mind—having fun. And so did every other Hobie owner. Therefore, you all have something in common. As you sail your boat more, you will discover that you can have a lot of fun sailing with other Hobies, whether racing around the bay together or exchanging ideas on the beach. The next natural step is to get together periodically to enjoy Hobie Catting. And there you have the basis for starting a Hobie Cat fleet.

A Hobie Cat fleet can offer you a chance to get together with other owners and enjoy the sport of Hobie sailing. The fleet can provide organized activities, both racing and fun family-oriented outings, educational and entertaining meetings, and introduce you to a lot of new friends with a common interest.

WHAT IS INVOLVED IN STARTING A FLEET

Starting a fleet is fairly simple. The first step is to contact all the owners in your area. (You can obtain names of owners from your local dealers and from the Hobie Cat Class Association.) Get all interested owners together for a meeting to elect officers and adopt a set of by-laws (a copy of the minimum fleet by-laws is enclosed). Once this is done, simply mail a list of members, officers and a copy of the by-laws to the Hobie Cat Class Association. Once approved, the fleet charter will be sent out and you're on your way to a fun season.

A new fleet should decide what type of activities they want to hold. This will pretty much depend on where most of the interests lie among the fleet members. We recommend a balanced schedule of racing and informal family activities like picnics, camping trips and fun races. Meetings should be planned to include educational topics such as sailing and racing, safe boating, maintenance and to include movies as they become available. Details on running a fleet and suggestions for activities can be found in the Fleet Officers Handbook which you will automatically receive when you form a fleet.

History of the Hobie Cat 14 Nationals

The first Hobie Cat 14 Nationals, held in 1969 in San Diego, California, had a total entry of 75 boats, mostly from Southern California. Leading this fleet was R. Paul Allen and second was Hobie Alter.

In 1970 the fleet moved to Hawaii for the Hobie Cat 14 Nationals. Held on some of the roughest, windiest days of the year, on qualifying day the northeast trades were gusting to thirty knots. Only one-half of the fleet of 27 finished the race. The following three days of racing found the wind diminishing until Sunday, when the Trades returned to their normal fifteen to eighteen knots. The crucible of big wind and rough water gave the Hawaiians and Californians the edge over the midwestern and eastern sailors. Cappy Sheely of Honolulu won by 1/4 point over Hobie Alter, Wayne Schafer of Capistrano Beach, third; Rick Naish of Honolulu, sixth; Leith Anderson on Honolulu, tenth; and Jeff Canepa of Santa Cruz, California, twelfth.

The 1971 Hobie 14 Nationals gave the light air eastern sailors their day as Tampa Bay, Florida fell to a flat calm with very light airs and



held for the full race schedule. Nevertheless, young sixteen year old Richard Loufek from California ghosted his Hobie to a decisive lead over 119 contestants with Wayne Schafer second; Hobie Alter third; John Ross-Duggan of Newport Beach, fourth; defending champion Cappy Sheely sixth; Rick Naish twelfth; Jeff Canepa thirteenth; and Leith Anderson sixteenth.

The 1972 Hobie 14 Nationals were held in Surfside, Texas under ideal Hobie 14 sailing conditions. The top five finishers automatically qualified as the USA team for the 1972 World Championship, Jeff Canepa, Wayne Schafer, Rick Naish, Richard Loufek and Denis Wilcox of Florida.

Contestants for the 1970-71-72 Nationals came from qualifying regattas held throughout the year in all of the 13 racing divisions of the United States, Virgin Islands and Hawaii. Each year over 500 Hobie 14 and 16 regattas are sanctioned, scheduled, results tabulated and mailed out by the Hobie Cat Class Association to all Hobie 14 and 16 owners in their publication, "Hotline."

This proves the Hobie Alter philosophy of establishing yacht racing conditions where the equipment is standard, low priced, easy to maintain, and the best man can be proven only by his seamanship and tactical ability and not by his pocketbook or membership in an exclusive yacht club. Herein lies the secret to the success of the Hobie 14 and 16, having come of age and having been accepted as full fledged members of the yacht racing community.







1973 Hobie Cat 14 and 16 National Championship Information Hobie Cat 14 Nationals Hobie Cat 16 Nationals

The growing popularity of Hobie lake sailing will be proven this year in the 1973 Hobie Cat 14 Nationals. Final plans are complete for this popular event to be held in the center of the California/Arizona desert, site of the historical London Bridge. This lake is created by the Colorado River dam at Parker, Arizona, and extends over 45 miles in length and is 3 miles wide at the Lake Havasu City location. The water is deep blue, with many fine beaches, quiet coves and inlets, and affords excellent swimming and boating the year round. The lake offers superb sailing from early spring to late fall with winds generally out of the north at 5 to 20 mph daily.

October 3 through 7 this year has been set aside by McCulloch Corp. as the time for the dedication of the famed and historical London Bridge. The bridge was dismantled and shipped stone-by-stone to Lake Havasu and authentically re-built to link the Arizona shore with the island, where all the action of the 1973 14' Nationals will take place.

A quaint old English village, complete with red phone booths, double-decker London bus and London taxi service, offers excellent dining, entertainment and gift shops. An area under the first span of the bridge has been prepared for dancing and outdoor entertainment. The natural amphitheater formed by the span echoes the sound of rock and dance bands. The dedication of the London Bridge will be kicked-off by the Hobie 14 Nationals and will include many exciting events. If skippers are planning to stay over to take in the bridge dedication, they should so indicate when making reservations.

An attractive part of this year's Nationals will be the availability of a Winnebago Brave motor home for transportation and accommodations from Las Vegas, Nevada, to Lake Havasu and return, taking in all of the many sights along the way. (See the recreational map of the area on an accompanying page.) The savings in accommodations, food and transportation made possible by this plan makes it well worth investigating. (See order blank page for further details.)

The 1973 Hobie 14 Nationals promise to be the most popular ever and the first one within driving distance of the large "Hobie population" on the West Coast and many skippers who have never attended a Nationals are planning for this one. Reservations should be made early if you are planning to attend.

Your hosts and co-sponsors for the 1973 Nationals will be The McCulloch Corporation, headed by Hobie-owner Robert McCulloch Jr., regatta chairman, The Lawrence Laurie Agency, Lake Havasu Yacht Club, Winnebago Motor Homes, Lake Havasu Chamber of Commerce and, of course, Coast Catamaran.

Lake Havasu has been the scene of an annual Catamaran Regatta every spring for the past 10 years, hosting some 235 catamarans early this year. The Lake Havasu Yacht Club Regatta Committee, under the direction of Dave Shay, regatta chairman (a yachtsman of extensive experience and an Americas Cup defending skipper), and Jess Underhill, communications and administration, offers professional assistance in conducting regattas on this beautiful lake.

You would be well advised to make an early application for this event as a capacity regatta is expected—see Reservations Forms, Pages 21 and 22. A form has been furnished for those requiring rental boats (see Page 23), due to transportation costs, a limited number will be available. Use the reservation forms in the accompanying section of your Hot Line and mail today!

The Hobie Cat Class Association has put it together on this one! As it now stands, the competing skippers and crews will be able to fly to Florida round trip, participate in the Nationals and join in a 3 day cruise to Nassau—all for a package price that will make staying at home seem expensive by comparison!





Nassau boasts a unique International flavor, exciting casinos, glamorous night clubs and a jet-set atmosphere laced with the elegance of British tradition and romantic Bahamian charm. 



Qualifying Information for The Division, Area and National Championship

This year Coast Catamaran and the Hobie Cat Class Association are revising the method for qualifying for the Nationals. We will place the emphasis on the Division championship and area championship. The areas are outlined on the map accompanying this article. The Division championship will qualify the top skipper in the 14 and and top skipper in the 16 to sail in the Nationals. Each Area Championship will qualify six Skippers. This will leave 9 spots open for last minute qualifying at the Nationals. The Total Fleet of Qualified A Fleet skippers will be 50 boats, the remaining 50 will go into a B or a C Fleet depending on the attendance at each National. The area championship will be held in a location central to each area and will be organized similar to small scale Nationals. Coast Catamaran will actively sponsor each area championship and will try to make it one of the most fun regattas of the year for that area.

The reason for the shift in our planning is two-fold. First, we are trying to eliminate the day of fleet breakdown sailing for the Nationals; we are going back to the system where a skipper qualifies directly into A fleet. Secondly, we want to have at least one Coast Cat sponsored major regatta convenient to almost everyone in the country at least once in the year. We feel by having the championships like this we can put a major Coast Catamaran sponsored regatta within 300 miles of almost everyone.

Boats will be furnished at the Nationals to the following contestants at no charge.

1st Place Winners 14 & 16 A Fleets—Division Championships
1st Place Winners 14 & 16 A Fleets—Area Championships
Defending 14 & 16 A Fleet Champions



Shown at "B" mark in a recent western lake regatta are two Hobie 14's. Note should be made of the generation gap in Hobie sails, number 50 indicates a different batten pattern and a left and right hand Hobie H. Number 7678, the newer sail shows only a left hand H. Both sails are identical in area, but due to the positioning of the batten pockets, battens are not interchangeable between sails.

Maintenance Tip/Cleaning **Your Hobie Sails**

The Hobie Cat Sail probably is exposed to more dirt, grease and grime than most sails in that it is bent on over a mud or sand beach or lake bank and trailered over dusty beaches and lake access roads. After capsizing, it becomes submersed in sometimes oil-polluted water and is stuck in shallow mud bay and lake bottoms.

Oily and dirty shrouds from trailering distances mark the sail on contact and should be wiped down before stepping the mast.

Fleet 23 has come up with a suggestion regarding the cleaning of dirty sails that makes sense and we will pass it along for what it is worth.

CAPT'N HOBIE MAINTENANCE TIP Cleaning Your Sails

If the sail is too large to wash in a tub, lay out on a clean concrete floor or lawn and wash with hot water and soap. Stubborn stains which will not wash off can be removed by the following methods:

Mildew: Keeping your sails clean and dry will discourage mildew formation. If they do appear, try to remove them as soon as possible. Once started, it will grow rapidly. Scrub the infected area with a stiff brush to remove as much mold as possible, then place stained portion in 1% cold water solution of bleach and let sit about 2 hours. Wash thoroughly and rinse with fresh water. Repeat if necessary.

Oil and Grease: Can be removed by applying trichloroethylene to the stained area. Metallic stains or rust stains can be removed by soaking the stained area in a warm solution of 2 parts concentrated Hydrochloric Acid per 100 parts water. Then, wash thoroughly and rinse with fresh water.

An interesting observation also quoted from Fleet 23 newsletter.

Tell Tales & Masthead Flies

One of the first obstacles a novice must overcome in learning to sail is his inability to pinpoint the wind direction. Most likely he has read a beginner's sailing book that shows in its diagrams wind direction as a thick black arrow. On the water, it is far more difficult, for the wind is, for all practical purposes, invisible.

The solution is to have some things aboard that indicate the wind direction. Among the simplest devices are "telltales," pieces of wool tied to the shrouds. "Angora" wood is the lightest and most sensitive to the wind, and red tends to be the most visible color. Various other materials have been used for telltales, including strips of ribbon or nylon stockings. But they are not nearly as sensitive and only come into their own when it's wet.

Another handy device is the "masthead fly," which is really a swiveling weather vane at the top of the mast. The fly should be extremely light for three reasons. First, any weight near the top of the mast can cause the boat to heel and pitch and this is undesirable. Second, a light masthead fly is sensitive to very light breezes. And third, the moment of inertia is lower in a light masthead fly. In other words, it will turn to the new wind direction and settle down quickly rather than swing past it because of

Before you buy a masthead fly, tip it on its side to make sure it is well balanced. The fly's vane arm should stay level. Neither the head nor the tail should dip towards the ground.


There are other ways to "see" the wind direction, but if you stick to telltales and a masthead fly, you can't go wrong.

For proper sail trim though, you need some indication of how the air is flowing over the sails. If a smoke pot could be suspended to windward of the sails, you could easily trim them so that you achieve a smooth flow. Many wind tunnel tests (called "Smoke Visualization Tests") have been done with smoke blowing past sails, and the difference between a smooth and a turbulent flow is very graphic.

Obviously you can't create a smoke-screen in front of your sailboat but you can do the next best thing: attach telltales to the sails and have them indicate whether the flow past the sail is turbulent or smooth.

A good practice is to place one telltale higher on one side of the sail than on the other. In certain sunlight conditions, it's hard to tell which telltale is on what side unless they are at different levels.

Telltales should be placed in three positions along the luff of the jib. They should be six to twelve inches back from the leading edge depending on the size of the boat.



When you change your heading without varying your jib trim, watch the middle set of telltales on the jib. If the sail is properly trimmed and flow is smooth over both sides of the sail (that is what we want), the telltales will both stream aft. (See figure 1.)

If the boat begins to head up into the wind, the windward telltales will start to flutter. (See figure 2.) Conversely, when the boat heads too far off the wind (see figure 3)' the leeward telltale will flutter because the angle of incidence (angle of attack) becomes so great that the wind is hitting mostly on the windward side of the sail. This will disrupt the flow over the leeward side resulting in turbulent flow.

It is most important to avoid this situation, for if there is turbulence on the lee side, the sail, which is an airfoil, is stalled and cannot produce the desired drive. A luffing sail is easy to see because it will start to flutter. A stalled sail isn't easy to see at all. But if you have these jib telltales you can trim the jib until the leeward telltales start to flutter. You'll find there is a very fine line between a luff and a stall, probably between a 5-100 change in heading or angle of attack.

Anyone who is learning to sail to windward by using telltales can employ a very simple rule that I call "Reinhorn's Law" (named in honor of Dr. Reinhorn, an Offshore Sailing School student in 1967).



How to Set a Starting Line Without Even Trying

We cannot claim that this device is original, but then again, we haven't seen it written up in quite a while. We made one up literally before breakfast one day out of scraps found in the basement. It was rather crude perhaps, but it was invaluable in helping us set an accurate starting line. It's especially helpful with a windward start when you have a large fleet, and the line is quite long.

Making the device is quite simple. All you really need are the materials shown in the accompanying drawing. Make sure that the disk and vane will rotate without friction on the handle. The less friction, the more sensitive the device will be in light air. It operates exactly like a weathervane.

To use the Genie, stand forward near the bow of the Committee Boat, in clean air, and hold it out at arm's length. Sight across the center pin and line it, and either the 90o, 80 , etc., pin at the outer edge with the other end of the starting line. You can then tell how the line is oriented with respect to the wind.

In setting a line, a topnotch Race Committee will always try to think like a contestant, setting the line so that the competitors have trouble making up their minds about where to start.

In open water, with no reason to favor one particular end because of tide or land, favoring the port end of the line by 10^{0} (using the $80^{\overline{0}}$ sighting pin) is about right for a large fleet of Hobies, though this may have to be modified a few degrees more if local conditions require it.

Guesswork and computation are eliminated and it is quick to use. It is better than using a masthead relative wind indicator with compass bearings because it measures the wind at the competitors' level and needs no arithmetical conversions. In short, this simple, cheap device does its job better than you can!

Reinhorn's Law says "Point the tiller at the fluttering piece of wool." If the leeward telltale on the sail is fluttering, it's because the boat is being sailed too hard, or too far away from the wind for the desired close-hauled course. The boat should be pointed more toward the wind, and putting the tiller to leeward will cure this.

If the windward telltale is fluttering, the boat is being sailed too close to the wind; in other words, on the verge of a luff. Putting the tiller to windward causes the boat to fall off, again solving the problem.

Some top skippers consider these telltales a crutch for incompetence because they have learned to sail properly without them. They do have a point if you, as the skipper, are sailing close hauled and steer entirely by the telltale on the jib.

One of the mistakes many skippers make is to try to keep the jib completely full without allowing either the windward or the leeward telltale to flutter; there are many times when this is the wrong maneuver.


For example, in a strong wind and smooth sea you may be able to "pinch" (carry a very slight luff in the jib) and still maintain your speed or go even faster. If you fell off until the sail became full and the telltale did not flutter, the resultant excessive heeling could well reduce the speed of the boat

So if you are a helmsman, take the telltale on the jib with a grain of salt and always learn to steer what you feel is the fastest course for the existing conditions.

"London Bridge Days" Celebration to Be Kicked Off by the 1973 Hobie Cat 14 Nationals

LAKE HAVASU CITY, ARIZ. — One of America's most unique annual celebrations will be witnessed by visitors at this lakefront resort city in early October — London Bridge Days, a 10-day festival, October 3-14, marking the second anniversary of the opening of the historic span at Lake Havasu City.

The Kick off for this celebration will be the colorful and exciting 1973 Hobie Catamaran 14 National Championship, to be held on October 3 thru 7th Lake Havisu, with the Nautical Inn as the Headquarters Hotel.

Lake Havisu can truly be called the desert Home of the Fast Catamaran Classes. Robert P. McCulloch Jr, an ex P-Cat-turned-Hobie Skipper, introduced the Catamaran to Lake Havisu over 10 years ago, by planning an annual Spring P-Cat and Nobie Cat Regatta, in which over 250 catamarans converge on this Beautiful 45 mile long blue water lake, for two days of skimming over the smoothe lake surface.

The Hobie 14 5th annual National Regatta is expected to attract over 150 skippers from all parts of the country.

1972 Defending Champion Jeff Canepa of Santa Cruz California will have his hands full defending his title in this event, as the skill and expertise required to navigate a Hobie 14 around the course in record time is being accomplished by an ever increasing number of national skippers.

The Lake Havisu Yacht Club, under the capable guidance of Robert P. McCulloch Jr., as Regatta Chairman, Dave Shay, Race Coordinator, and Jess Underhill as Safety Patroll Chairman, Will Coordinate all National Regatta Activities.

Townspeople will be wearing a variety of English costumes, from Elizabethan to Victorian, storefronts will be decorated to look like English village shops, and the busy schedule of games, sports, contests and shows will be climaxed on Saturday evening, October 13, by the gala Anniversay Ball on the embankment under the huge north arch of the bridge. Les Brown and his Band of Renown, who played at both the

dedication ceremonies and the first anniversary celebrations, will again provide the musical entertainment for the ball.

By the time the second anniversary rolls around, more than 2,000,000 people will have visited London Bridge in its new American home, making it second only to the Grand Canyon as an Arizona tourist attraction. The massive structure, whose stone-by-stone reconstruction here took three years, is one of the Southwest's most spectacular daytime and after-dark sights.

Besides recapturing the spirit of Merrie Olde England with the costume contest, dart tournaments, a pancake race across London Bridge and a number of other traditional events, London Bridge Days will offer an exciting menu of pageantry and outdoor sports for visitors, who may also take part in any of the games or contests if they choose.

The festivities will include a parade on Saturday, Oct. 13, a parade of gaily-decorated boats under London Bridge, golf and tennis tournaments, a beard contest, an arts and crafts bazaar, a giant beach barbecue, a beach dance for young people, a community pancake breakfast and on the final day, sunrise services at London Bridge.

Accommodations at Lake Havasu City have more than doubled during the past year, with one motel after another (Ramada Inn, Windsor Inn, E-Z 8 Motel, Shakespeare Inn) opening up in response to the demand created by the attraction of London Bridge.

In addition to watching or taking part in the festivities of London Bridge Days, visitors may also avail themselves of the world of recreational opportunities that have already made Lake Havasu City a year-round resort capital. Golf, tennis, fishing swimming, boating, water skiing, hiking and riding, sun-bathing, rockhounding — these are just a few of the outdoor fun activities enjoyed year 'round at this popular resort community.


The Lake Havasu City Chamber of Commerce, with the support of local business and community organizations, is coordinating the London Bridge Days celebration.


