Hobie PMA Champions

Speed under sail in all it's forms has intrigued man for centuries. When wind was the only source of propulsion on the sea, man raced against time, scurvy, diminishing water and food supplies to prove that the world was round, discover and claim continents for their sovereign kings.

Speed under sail was the greatest offensive or defensive weapon in the sea battles of giant naval armadas of the world's naval powers. In world commerce, America's pride of the seas, the Flying Cloud and her sister ships, Down East full rigged clippers, carried tea from China to a young country. Opening the west through their eighty-nine day passages from the Eastern Seaboard to the gold fields of California via Cape Horn.

And finally, the giant five-masted steel barques, the largest sailing ships afloat raced from Australia to England with wool and grain and ended the centuries of the era of sail.

The Tradition of the sea; Admiralty law, the law of the sea; the Rules of the Road at Sea, were tested, tried and proven under sail

Yacht racing as we know it today is man's way of continuing this quest for speed, utilizing only the power of the wind. Present day materials, boat and sail making and design technique, has made it possible to increase speed a few knots over some of the faster early day vessels.

Then came Hobie Alter. Utilizing a new but yet old polynesian concept, new materials, new production methods, he was able to reduce the drag of water on the hulls by incorporating a unique hull design. He further reduced drag by doing away with a fin keel, by using man's weight was able to apply leverage of sail against the wind and there was born the Hobie Catamaran, fully capable of sailing faster than the wind. The cycle is complete, daily we take our Hobie down to the sea, bay or lake and continue man's age old conquest of speed under sail, only today for the sheer joy, thrill and excitement of sailing in the largest one-design catamaran class in the world—the Hobie.

In the recent 1973 – 8th Annual Pacific Multihull Association Time Trials, the stock production model Hobie catamarans 14 & 16 proved their superiority over all makes and manufacturers of catamarans from the giant C & D Class racing machines to the prototype hydrofolls and one-of-a-kind experimental models.

The superior Hobie design was not only proven in the Time Trials, on a broad reach against the clock, but also in the

The top efficiency rating was won by a stock Hobie 16 skippered by Don Oltmans of Fleet 57, Marina del Rey, California with an *efficiency factor of 2.18; Second place was a Toronado with an efficiency factor of 1.96; Third was a Hobie 14 with 1.7 times wind speed; Fourth and Fifth were experimental models with a factor of 1.6 and 1.5 followed by two Hobie 16's for Sixth and Seventh at about 1.4 factor.

*Efficiency Factor-Boat speed/speed x P.M.A. rating x wind velocity correction factor. In the overall boat speed category the Hobie 16's placed 3rd, 5th, and 6th. In Division 1 of the 2 day Regatta the Hobie Team of 14 and 16's made a clean sweep-with 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5th, 6th and 7th corrected time, with 2nd through 4th in first to finish category.

Once a year there comes a time when the fastest skippers of the fastest catamaran class come together for a battle of the giants to determine the champion 14 & 16 skippers and crew. If this information seems redundant, please bear with the completely uninformed for which this is intended.

The colorful sight of over 100 Hobie Catamarans skimming over the water at speeds that equal most city speed limits is all fun and games, but to the beau, wife, friend, last nights date or spectator that is trying to find out how their favorite skipper is doing it can be all very confusing.

Hobie 14 & 16 Nationals

A Hobie regatta for the most part is not unlike any yachting event of this type, but still different enough to justify a brief description.

During the period of the last 6 months Skippers from 13 divisions including Hawaii and the Virgin Islands have competed for the top spot, and in winning have qualified for the 1973 Nationals, both in 14 and 16 classes.

October is Hobie Nationals Month. Shown here are fleets of 14's & 16's taken during the 1973 Midwinters, Apollo Beach, Florida. This is a sample of the starting line-up expected for the 1973 Nationals with fleets of over 50 boats at each start.

This year a 2nd opportunity to qualify was given Skippers of the Continental United States by allowing the top 6 winners of the Area Championships to qualify for the Nationals from each of the 4 areas of the country. (See the Division and area map on Page 21.)

Thursday's four races (weather permitting) will fill the remaining unqualified positions and break out the fleets. The first 50 finishers, including all pre-qualified contestants go into A Fleet; the next 50 finishers into B Fleet and the remainder into C Fleet. The points for the day will go toward a 10 race series as 4 races. The remaining races will be in this fleet order.

There is a separate course chart for the 14 Nationals and the 16 Nationals. Essentially they are the same except that the Lake Havasu chart has an extra buoy or two to allow for contingencies, such as varying wind direction.

All starts are to windward or sailing into the wind from "S" mark, the Committee Boat. The precise course number to be sailed is hoisted on the Committee Boat five minutes prior to the start. This course number is indicated on the chart. The letters on the chart are for a different buoy sequence here again depending on wind directions.


The "F" or starting signals consist of a series of blasts on a horn or a bright Very flare, as a prelude to the hoisting of the white flag and a long blast on a horn, or the firing of a cannon. This signal starts the ten minute countdown to the start. At four minutes, thirty seconds the white flag is struck. At five minutes a blue flag is hoisted, accompanied by a blast on a horn or cannon. At nine minutes thirty seconds the blue flag is struck. At ten minutes a red flag is hoisted, accompanied by the blast on the horn or cannon, signaling the start of the race. Contestants will tack to the next mark to windward, then a reaching leg to the leeward mark, followed by a tack to windward to the finish line.


Should a contestant's boat strike another boat or violate any one of a number of rules of the Class Association, the skipper can clear his record by doing two 360° circles involving two jibes and two tacks. In certain rules infractions he could be disqualified. In striking a marker buoy or the committee boat, the skipper must re-round the mark properly. The vessel on the starboard tack or wind on the right side of the sail has the right of way over a vessel on the port tack with the wind on the left side of the sail. A vessel on the wind or heading into the wind has the right of way over a vessel running off the wind.

Scoring is computed on the order of finishing, with one exception—that first place earns % point not one point, second is two points, third is three points, etc., with an even number of races a throw out race is allowed. This means that the highest point race is thrown out giving a skipper one race to breakdown in and not be penalized. The total of these places after all races have been sailed and protests heard determines the winner in reverse order, lowest score 1st place, second lowest 2nd place and third lowest 3rd place, etc.

A Hobic Cat regatta is unique in that no where else in the yachting fraternity has the guarantee that the equipment to be used is precisely equal in every dimension and quality of material.

Hobie Catamaran International Class Association

The racing program is quite unique in that there is no yacht club affiliation required of participants and the program is coordinated and administered by the manufacturer. Coast Catamaran Corporation. Hobie felt that yacht clubs serve an extremely valuable function on the yacht racing scene, but it was unfortunate that small boat racing was so costly (often times exceeding the cost of the boat when you consider yacht club initiation fees and annual dues). Worst of all you couldn't even race a couple of times to see if you enjoyed it before you invested in a club membership! Why not establish a program where all Hobie Cat owners have the opportunity participate in races as often as they like at minimum expense to them? That way everyone who can afford a Hobie Cat can afford to race with a minimum of bother and cost. Consequently the Hobie Cat races are open to any Hobie Cat skipper who wishes to participate and owners are regularly notified of activities in their areas.

Hobie has always kept in mind the relative expense to the skipper when setting up the racing program and racing rules. It is for this reason that the racing rules are perhaps the strictest of any onedesign class anywhere. The thinking on this is two-fold: 1st - encourage skippers to concentrate on sailing techniques to win by discouraging the development and use of "racing goodies" and 2nd - to prevent skippers from engaging in a high cost "equipment" duel. We have even gone so far as to require that all sails used in official Hobie Cat Regattas be purchased through Coast Catamaran. In so doing we insure all stock boats are competitive---no one can go out and have a high priced sail maker make an exotic sail which gives him either an actual or psychological advantage. This idea holds true throughout our rules---the changes allowed are simple, inexpensive, and do change the actual characteristics of the boat---they just make some things more convenient.

The foremost objective of the Hobie Cat

racing program is to provide each participating skipper with the challenge and fun that is associated with our races. The challenge of competing with other skippers of equivalent ability experience---the challenge of developing and improving your sailing skills in an effort to sail faster than everyone else. The fun of associating with other skippers who all have a common interest and of participating in the festivities which frequently are included in a regatta program---the barbeques and banquets, the chance to camp on the beach with other Hobie Cat owners and have your boat at your back doorstep--poised and ready for a relaxing frolic between races.

Popularity of the Hobie Cat has skyrocketed as evidenced by the more than 14,000 boats sailing in just four years. Production in 1973 will approach 6,000 out of the four plants in San Juan Capistrano alone, Other plants are operating in Mexico City, Australia, South Africa, France, South America and Japan




Key Biscayne Course Chart

Hobie 14 Defending Champions Corner Richard Loufek 1972 Worlds Champion

Richard Loufek, age 20 has gone as far as he can go in Hobie 14 competition. In 3½ years of sailing and racing Hobies, he has claimed the National Champion title fourth in the 1972 Nationals and now the 1972 Worlds Championship in Honolulu. Richard's sailing experience over a period of six years has been extensive in the dinghy fleet, having sailed Lido 14, Sabots, Sunfish, Windmill, Cal Cats, Aqua Cats and finally Hobies. Quite frankly Richard says that the thing that sold him the Hobie is the racing program. No other fleet offers the variation of sailing locations and the mobility that the Hobie Class Association offers.

In the Worlds competition in Hawaii, Richard maintained a consistent, comfortable 4th to 8th position during the stiff competition of the heavy air days, only to pick up the necessary points to win when the wind dropped to light air.

More likely than not the hard wind skippers beat themselves by loosing their cool when the wind dropped, instead of following Richards advice and keeping calm and concentrating on the problem of getting the boat moving in these conditions.

Richard is a good example for the younger hobie skippers to follow. Surely the self confidence, the power of concentration and the power of positive thought, gained in his Hobie Racing Career will be of great value to him as he plays the game of life.

Jeff Canepa 1972 National Champion


Jeff Canepa has been sailing and surfing the Santa Cruz, California water since he was nine years old. Jeff's early sailing experience was in El Toros, Jester Dingys and Newport Flippers; later in Tempests, 505's, Cal 30-38-40 Keel Boats. Santa Cruz waters are not exactly what can be called tropical, as the temperature is pretty low the year around. The Northwesterly prevailing on-shore wind blows with a vengence. Jeff's training in small boat sailing and handling under these considtions has been proven in his recent capture of the 1972 Hobie Cat 14' National Championship in Surfside, Texas, and his near win (second by a 1½ point) of the Worlds Championship in Hawaii. Jeff has been sailing Hobie 14's less than three years, his background in dingy racing combined with his Hobie racing certainly proves the old axiom, practice makes perfect.

Jeff is now 20 years old and has many friends in National and International Hobie circles.

The greatest hour for the Canepa team was at the 1972 World Championships, held in Hawaii. Jeff led the fleet with a wide point margin throughout most of the first seven races of the series. In the seventh race he was rammed by another boat and suffered severe muscle bruises on the lower back, an injury that surely would have put most skippers out of the race. However, Jeff made the last day's races with severe muscle spasms, losing only by a margin of 1½ points to his friend and sailing buddy. Richard Loufek. To the spectators and press that made up Jeff's army of rooters, Jeff will be the 1972 International Hobie Champion, due to his outstanding leadership throughout seven races, even to the point of being dismasted, re-stepping the mast at sea and making the starting gun, a superhuman task in anyone's book.

Jeff's shining good sportsmanship in his loss of the first position by such a narrow margin should be a good example for all Hobie skippers to follow and we will put Jeff Canepa at the top of our list for the sportsmanlike way he played the game. After all, isn't this what our Hobie lifestyle is all about.





Hobie Alter, built a completely new yacht racing philosophy around this concept and has taken the buying game out of yacht racing and replaced it with the individual sailing ability and applied yacht racing tactics.

It is impossible to buy a better hull or a better sail because there is none better. If there were, it would be a violation of class rules to use anything but standard Hobie Sails and Hulls. Occasionally, a little leeway has been extended in the way of hardware and fittings, but the basic dimensions are exactly the same.

Again, we state that no where in yachting can you go out and race and know that your competition has exactly the same boat you have. The only difference being that the boats may be "tuned" to suit the individual, raking the mask just so, shaping the sail battens to suit. There really isn't much more that can be done short of going out and sailing a better race.

History of the Hobie Cat 14 Nationals

The first Hobie Cat 14 Nationals, held in 1969 in San Diego, California, had a total entry of 75 boats, mostly from Southern California. Leading this fleet was R. Paul Allen and second was Hobie Alter.

In 1970 the fleet moved to Hawaii for the Hobie Cat 14 Nationals. Held on some of the roughest, windiest days of the year, on qualifying day the northeast trades were gusting to thirty knots. Only one-half of the fleet of 27 finished the race. The following three days of racing found the wind diminishing until Sunday, when the Trades returned to their normal fifteen to eighteen knots. The crucible of big wind and rough water gave the Hawaiians and Californians the edge over the midwestern and eastern sailors. Cappy Sheely of Honolulu won by 1/4 point over Hobie Alter, Wayne Schafer of Capistrano Beach, third; Rick Naish of Honolulu, sixth; Leith Anderson on Honolulu, tenth; and Jeff Canepa of Santa Cruz, California, twelfth.

The 1971 Hobie 14 Nationals gave the light air eastern sailors their day as Tampa Bay, Florida fell to a flat calm with very light airs and held for the full race schedule. Nevertheless, young sixteen year old Richard Loufek from California ghosted his Hobie to a decisive lead over 119 contestants with Wayne Schafer second; Hobie Alter third; John Ross-Duggan of Newport Beach, fourth; defending champion Cappy Sheely sixth; Rick Naish twelfth; Jeff Canepa thirteenth; and Leith Anderson sixteenth.

The 1972 Hobie 14 Nationals were held in Surfside, Texas under ideal Hobie 14 sailing conditions. The top five finishers automatically qualified as the USA team for the 1972 World Championship, Jeff Canepa, Wayne Schafer, Rick Naish, Richard Loufek and Denis Wilcox of Florida.

Contestants for the 1970-71-72 Nationals came from qualifying regattas held throughout the year in all of the 13 racing divisions of the



United States, Virgin Islands and Hawaii. Each year over 500 Hobie 14 and 16 regattas are sanctioned, scheduled, results tabulated and mailed out by the Hobie Cat Class Association to all Hobie 14 and 16 owners in their publication, "Hotline."

This proves the Hobie Alter philosophy of establishing yacht racing conditions where the equipment is standard, low priced, easy to maintain, and the best man can be proven only by his seamanship and tactical ability and not by his pocketbook or membership in an exclusive yacht club. Herein lies the secret to the success of the Hobie 14 and 16, having come of age and having been accepted as full fledged members of the yacht racing community.

History of the 16 Nationals

The 1971 Hobie Cat 16 Nationals were held at Coronado Island, California in weather conditions varying from light air to much wind. San Diego Harbor off of Coronado is a superb spot to sail in normally in the prevailing North Westerlies, however, this event caught a south easterly storm that brought a cold rain and rough bay chop and made difficult sailing for all contestants. Hobie Alter survived the ordeal to win top position as National Champion.

1972 Hobie 16 Nationals were held at Surfside, Texas on the Gulf Coast. The Hobie 14 Nationals had just been completed under ideal weather conditions on the same location. However, the 16's were not to be so lucky. Thursday's last race had to be cancelled due to heavy wind and sea conditions. Friday, a heavy gulf coast fog moved in and the races had to be cancelled. Saturday, the fog lifted and the wind shifted to the south east and increased to 25-35 knots and races were again cancelled. This condition continued through Sunday. Monday, three races were held in favorable conditions; unfortunately, many skippers could not extend their leave from jobs and responsibilities and had to depart, this included some of the top contenders.

This was definitely a survival championship and first place went to heavy air sailors from Hawaii, Rick Naish and crew Jeff Faulker. Defending champion, Hobie Alter and crew wife Nancy placed second by a narrow 4 point margin. Third was Nick Steel and crew Jerry King of Balboa Island, Calif.

Hobie 16 skippers are looking forward to the 1973 Nationals at Key Biscayne, Florida. Hopefully to a favorable, stable weather condition that will make a good contest for the slate of excellent qualified skippers.


