#### REPRINT

The past Hotline, Maintenance section (page 4) stated that your sails can be cleaned with hydrofluoric acid. Acids are dangerous and should be handled with extreme care. For this reason it is recommended that acid not be used for cleaning sail cloth.

### **EDITORIAL**

With the energy crisis breathing down our necks, we are forced to re-evaluate our thinking about a lot of things we do. Sailing is one of the few recreations that does not rely heavily on the use of gasoline. Even big sailboats use only a cupful of gas to maneuver in and out of slips. This can be done without turning the engine on at all and skippers might even find that they possess skills they never knew they had.

Having lived near the water in Newport Beach for the majority of my adult years, I am used to seeing countless power boats smoking and chugging around the bay. Somehow, they always seem to be on the windward side, or I find myself sailing behind some huge monster with both exhaust pipes spewing noxious diesel smoke at me. I for one will be glad to see power replaced once again by sail.

France and Germany are even building commercial freighters that will sail from port to port.

Within the past couple months, the bay in Newport appears much quieter. There seems to be many more sailboats than power boats in the water, and of these, the Hobie Cat is the most prevalent. For the first time, small non-polluting sailboats are coming into their own. With so much gloom and foreboding about the energy crisis, it's nice to know that the future of sailing, especially Hobie sailing, never looked brighter.

Good sailing—it's going to be a great year!

# Starboard Tack Has Right of Way Over Port Tack

(starboard tack means mainsail on port side)

This fundamental rule covers the great majority of racing situations. When you're reading the rules, notice how many start with the phrase, "with boats on the same tack"—because if they're not, then that rule doesn't apply and starboard tack wins.—ref: rule 36

You are always on either starboard tack or port tack, except when tacking, jibing, or aground or disabled, capsized or at anchor.—ref: definition "on a tack"

Going before the wind, you're on the tack opposite to the side your mainsail's on.

Fine print point: the rules define your tack as the one corresponding to your windward side, but note that windward side is opposite the mainsail, not necessarily the side the wind is blowing on. Thus, going downwind you have an option, and you can force yourself onto starboard tack by sailing-by-the-lee when everyone else is on port tack.—ref: definition "leeward" and "windward"

Tacking begins when the boat passes head-to-wind; until then, even though luffing, the boat is on the tack it was on before it headed up. Jibing begins when the boom passes the center of the boat.—ref: definition "tacking" "jibing"

EXCEPTION . . . buoy room

The right to buoy room outweighs starboard tack.—ref: rule 42.1

Provided it isn't a start line mark (buoy room doesn't count at the start) and provided it is not a beat to the mark (tacking required to get there) or provided you don't have to tack to round the mark. If either is the case, then starboard tack still counts.

Remember that the right to buoy room must be established when the nearest boat is within two lengths of the buoy, or by tacking into overlap.—ref: rule 42.3

EXCEPTION . . . tacking or jibing too close

It is possible to tack or jibe into a starboard tack right of way so close that the port tack boat can't keep clear, in which case "starboard tack" won't save you.—ref: rule 41.2

Remember, a boat tacking or jibing must keep clear of a boat that is *on* either tack, and the other fellow has no obligation to begin trying to avoid you until you complete your tacking or jibing maneuver.

EXCEPTION . . . returning to start or re-round

Boats that were over the line at the start gun have all the usual rights so long as they continue to sail the course, but forfeit all rights (except with regard to others who are returning) when they start back for the line.—ref: rule 44

The same thing applies to boats returning to re-round a touched mark . . . OK so long as sailing the course, but no rights at all when returning (except to other returners).

PLAN TO BE ON STARBOARD IN THE CROWDS. Start on starboard when you can; arrive at marks on starboard when you can; other things being equal, sail downwind on starboard. Watch out for the starboard tacker that is overtaking you when you're on port.

Rembember, in cases of conflict or doubt, the benefit of the doubt will go to the boat on starboard tack.—ref: Appeal No. 22

# HOBIE 12' CHRISTMAS CHARITY REGATTA

When the Hobie Class Association decides to pull off a charity regatta, this is what happens. First of all, we had to find a charity (we chose the American Cancer Society), and next, a place to hold the regatta.


We went to one of the most popular restaurants in Newport Beach, California, The Rusty Pelican. The Rusty Pelican supplied T-shirts, beer and souvenir coffee mugs. Well, things were looking good, but we still needed that little extra something. A great press boat was needed, not just a boat, but "THE" boat. Windward Passage, the most talked about ocean racer of our time was the ticket. Passage is 73 feet long, ketch rigged and probably has had more miles pass under her than the Santa Fe Railroad, not to mention the amount of hardware she brings home. So, we asked Rex Banks, her sailmaster if we could use her, and without batting an eye he said, "OK."

Buddy Ebsen, star of the very popular T.V. series, "Barnaby Jones" chose to enter. Ebsen is a Newport Beach resident and also the owner of a 36 foot catamaran, "Polynesian Concept." Buddy thought sailing the Hobie 12 was great and he sailed well in all three races.

We divided the classes into five divisions, all shooting for perpetual trophys. One division consists of the local sailors (V.I.P. Trophy) such as Ron Holder, Dingy Designer; Mark Hughes, kite champion and owner of Australian 18, "Travel Lodge" and the long time Hobie sailors such as Wayne Schafer, The Beauchamp's, and of course, Hobie, to mention just a few. All the local dealers (Dealer Class Trophy) showed up for a little competitive sailing and Coast Catamaran threw in some factory personnel (Department Representative Trophy) to prove that we could sail as well as build boats. Fifteen 12' owners (12' Owner Trophy) came prepared to prove that they could sail as well as anyone else.

Except for a few humorous mishaps, all went well. Windward Passage slipped on her anchor and nearly drifted into some nearby power boats. The day was unseasonably warm and the wind never did blow more than 1½ knots, but somehow, the 51 Hobie 12's ghosted their way around the marks.




A good vantage point from our press boat: Windward Passage




Rounding "C" mark in light air





## Sail/Boom Carrier

Many Hobie skippers own automobiles that won't permit the storage of sails, booms, and other long objects. Tying everything down on top of the trampoline is one way, but not very safe. Another, and one of the best, is to build a plywood box and mount it on the trailer.


This idea is fine, but the boom length for a Hobie 16' is 9'6"; standard plywood comes in 4' x 8' sheets. Although 10' sheets are available, the price keeps most people away.

However, there is another way. Ray DeCosta of Scottsdale, Arizona has found a very simple solution. He uses plastic irrigation pipe, 8" in diameter cut into 10' and 6' lengths. One for the main (with boom attached) and another for the jib. The pipe is secured to the trailer by a ¼" threaded rod bent in a semi-circle and covered with a length of garden hose. The end of the rods are then bolted through the trailer frame at the front and rear. The rear of the tubes are secured and water-proofed by installing an 8" plug of plywood or chipboard and sealed with marine caulk. For added security, pipe clamps are tightened around the seal and held in place with wood screws.

The front is closed with similar plugs joined by a 2 x 4, and attached by springs to the trailer. This allows easy access to the carrier, but prevents entry of dirt and water while on the road. A tight seal is not needed, since this end of the tube does not normally enter the water when launching.

The total cost of this carrier was about \$12. Since the irrigation pipe usually comes in 50' lengths, it would help to have two friends also construct carriers. Sometimes the plastic suppliers have scrap piles that they will let you go through—you can save even more this way. ABS pipe was used in this carrier, but you can also use PVC or sewer pipe if the cheaper ABS is not available.

The result is a strange-looking carrier (even power boat owners ask what the tubes are for), but it works, and even solves the storage problem when you get home.

### McKibbon Makes 10,000th Sail


The 10,000th Hobie 16 Sail was completed December 10, 1973.

Coast Catamaran, having 7 licensees throughout the world, is the manufacturer of the multihulled, sloop-rigged craft, and has sold over 10,000 of the 16's and over 15,000 14-foot Cats. They can also boast that the Hobie Class Association is now the largest, active Class in the world.

Don McKibbin, sailmaker, started building sails 14 years ago, and has worked his way to becoming one of the top sailmakers in the industry, producing sails of all types in his most modern facility in Irvine, California.

The loft is broken up into two divisions . . . one-half for custom sails with floor-level sewing machines, and the other half for the production of Hobie Cat sails. The Hobie Cat division has an average of 35 employees—some having been in the sailmaking business for more than eighteen years.

All Hobie sails are cut on a pattern that is never changed. Bill Cummins, Production Manager, says they have cut over 13,000 Hobie 14 sails and the 10,000th Hobie 16 sail is a milestone in Catamaran building as well as sailmaking.



The McKibbin loft, in addition to making all of the trapeze seats, sailcovers, duffle bags, and other Hobie Cat accessories, has the capabilities of producing over 65 sets of sails per day.

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



# CAPISTRANO BEACH—November, 1973




Morey Blackman punches his boat through a small Capistrano wave.

# 1974 Nationals Qualifications System

The Hobie Class Association has revised the Qualifying system used in the past years. The new system is designed to allow a greater amount of skippers to qualify for the 1974 Nationals with the least amount of travel. The Hobie Class Association felt that it was unfair that many Hobie sailors did not have the time available or the capability to travel great distances to a regatta, especially with the threat of gas rationing upon us.

The Hobie 12, 14, and 16's all qualify for the Nationals under this system.

### I. Nationals Qualifications

100 boats qualify to Nationals by the following:

80-from division points racing

13—from division championships

6—Open

1—National championship

### II. Points Racing:

- Using a percentage system based on the number of entrants, points will be earned toward divisional standings; only the best five races count.
- B) Only sanctioned races count—a sanctioned race is: date and location approved by Hobie Class Association for master calendar, scheduled in advance; open to anyone.
- C) Weekly fleet races will count as one if 4 or more races make up the series.
- D) The number of qualifiers from each division will be based on the number of boats in that division (see map below).

#### IV. Nationals Race Schedule


Two days of racing (each skipper racing against each other at least once) will qualify the top 50 skippers for the final National Championship races and the second 50 for the Governors Cup Regatta.

The final sail-offs will consist of four races. More information will follow in the next Hotline.

The top 50 skippers will then qualify for the Nationals and the second 50 will qualify for the Governors Cup Trophy.

The final sail-offs will be 4 races on the last day of the Nationals (weather permitting).

# Midwinters West – Guaymas, Mexico 1974

Guaymas, Mexico is again the site of the 4th Annual Midwinters. In the past, Bahia de Algodonies "Bay of Cotton," has proven to be a fantastic regatta location. The wide flat beach is great for sailing to and from and also just to roam around.

The theme will again be "Catch 22," the scene of Joseph Heller's best selling novel about World War II, and MGM's movie release of two years ago. There is a 5000 foot runway and bombed out buildings that were left behind; the runway has been closed down due to a large amount of smugglers using light aircraft.

As usual, fun and games will prevail; the beer and shrimp will be abundant along with a Mariachi band to serenade you to a 1st place in the regatta.

Camping facilities will again be taken care of, water will be brought in and the sanitation facilities will be provided.

For those of you who don't wish to "rough it" in



our primitive camp, there are hotels about three miles from the site with restaurants and bars (some units have kitchenettes). All are reasonably priced (\$12.00 to \$16.00 per day for two people). Here is what is available:

The drive from the hotels to the Catch 22 area takes about five minutes over paved roads, so everything is fairly close. Make reservations NOW if you want a room. Another hotel we recommend is the Guaymas Inn (about twelve miles from the site toward Guaymas). It is run by an American and is exceptionally clean with excellent food. The rates are quite competitive; restaurant and bar are reasonable. Address inquiries to the Guaymas Inn, Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico.

There is a small general store in the area of the hotels, and of course, there are major shopping areas in Guaymas about twenty minutes away.





# **Tourist Regulations**

Each person must obtain a tourist card in order to cross the border. Fill out the enclosed form and mail it to any Mexican Consulate office or at the address shown on the form. There's no charge for this card, so send for it even if you aren't sure you can go. You can obtain your card at the border, but we urge you to obtain it beforehand. You'll save yourself time and possible expense.

You must have proof of ownership for your vehicle, boat and trailer to cross the border. If you aren't the legal owner, be sure to have a notarized statement from the legal owner giving you permission to transport said vehicle, boat or trailer into Mexico for the length of time you intend to stay.

Mexico has a big problem with animal disease, especially rabies. We advise against taking dogs. If you find it necessary to take your dog, you must have a current Health Certificate issued by a veterinarian and a rabies certification is mandatory for return to the United States.

# **Suggested Routes of Travel**

Coming from the West Coast: Cross at either Tijuana, Mexicali or San Luis and follow Mexico 2 to Santa Ana, then Mexico 15 to the Guaymas area . . . or . . . cross at Nogales and follow Mexico 15 to Guaymas. NOTE: We have found San Luis to Sonita is 127 miles with no gas stations or towns between.

Coming from the East: Cross at Nogales and follow Mexico 15 to Guaymas.

Guaymas is an easy five hours from Nogales on the West Coast of the Mexican mainland. The turnoff to San Carlos is about four miles north of Guaymas and is marked by a sign pointing to the right. If you pass an airport on your left, you have gone about a mile too far. Once on the road to San Carlos, go about six miles to the general store on the right. To reach the regatta site, take the road to the right just before the store and follow it to the site. The hotels are on down the road to San Carlos a short way. If you are going to stay at the Guaymas Inn, simply proceed on Highway 15 about two miles past the San Carlos turnoff and you will find it on the left side of the road.

Proof of citizenship must be presented at the time Tourist Card is issued, and should remain in the possession of the traveler during the entire trip (Birth Certificate, Army or Navy Discharge Papers, Identification Card, Naturalization Certificate, Voting Certificate, Passport, or Affidavit of citizenship). Canadian citizens by birth, must present a valid passport.

If you travel by car the permit thereof is valid for the same term as your tourist card.




