

Hobie Sailing School Means

Fun. . . Friends. . . Profit

Because our sailing school program was such a great help in making our fleet grow, I would like to take the opportunity to tell other fleets how we did it.

It's easy! Miami Fleet 36 proved it in their first year running of the sailing school.

To us it means a way of making friends and money for our Fleet. We've been holding these sailing schools for the past three years and have approximately ten sessions a year. Because we make at least \$250 every time we have one, our Fleet now owns its own committee boat and we are able to have dinners and parties at no cost to members.

Put it together. The local Hobie Dealer takes care of the advertising in the newspaper, usually 10 days in advance. By Wednesday, I have a list of the names of the 25 students that have paid \$10.00 in advance. And then the fun begins — calling fleet members to take part of the school and bargaining for who will teach the single girls that we have registered.

Al Jenney, our 1974 Vice Commodore, was our master instructor. He sets a Hobie 16 up on the beach and gives one hour of ground school and terminology. In the meantime I am faced with the big decision of who will take who out. Usually I try to pair off the best single instructors with the single students.

After AI finishes his lecture, we divide the class into two students per boat and they go out to practice what they have learned on the beach. They stay out for an hour or so and then come back to the beach for a lesson on knot tying.


Since racing is a big part of our fleet activities, after the knot tying lesson we organize a Lemans start Regatta from the beach. After the race is my favorite time, when we all get to know each other's section. We have all made many friends and good Hobie sailors from these sailing schools and this has also made our Fleet the biggest Hobie Fleet in the world -156 members in 1974!

I would like to thank all the Fleet 36 members who made our sailing program a success and to thank AI Jenney for his time and knowledge in running every sailing school that we had. And to Performance Marine for advertising and for donating all of the drinks.

Differing from normal Hobie regattas, the purpose of the Charity Regatta was not to win over stiff competition, but to enjoy a fun day of sailing while donating all proceeds to a worthy cause — The American Cancer Society.

Coast Catamaran provided a fleet of Hobie 12's and Hobie 10's (the latest addition to the Hobie family) for the day of racing. Instead of having normal A, B, and C Fleet classes, with each skipper racing in a class according to his ability, the skippers were divided into five categories for this special, fun regatta: V.I.P.'s: press representative; Hobie 12' owners; dealership representatives; and a representative from each of Coast Catamaran's departments.


Since a number of the competitors had little or no past sailing experience (let alone racing experience) the course and instructions were laid out as simply as possible: LEAVE ALL MARKS TO THE LEFT SIDE OF THE BOAT. (And I'd venture to say that's about as simple as you can get!)

The Wind God, on this particular occasion, must have taken the day off, for the prevailing breeze in Newport Harbor never rose above the maximum velocity of a strong cough, and the few times a puff did come through, it was barely enough to ripple the water. The day was bright and sunny, though, and in spite of the depressing wind conditions, the racers put on an excellent show. They were encouraged to be relaxed and race with "fun" in mind . . . and indeed, that's just what they did. And the fact that most normal sailing rules were "overlooked", and the skippers were allowed to use any means possible to get around the course . . . short of paddling . . . made it an exceptionally entertaining race to watch!

With the aid of a beer or two . . . or three (to relieve the tension spawned by the "hard-core" competition) the skippers finally made it through the four-race series, with the following emerging victorious in their category: V.I.P. — Richard Loufek (1973 Hobie Cat World Champion); press — John Rousmaniere ("Yachting" magazine); dealer — Fletcher Olson (Hobie Newport); Hobie 12' owner — Steve Hatch (of Riverside, Ca.); and Coast Cat department rep. — Jim Black (glider division).

It was, without a doubt, a fun-filled day for all, and with close to \$700.00 in proceeds raised for the American Cancer Society, the 2nd Annual Hobie Christmas Charity Regatta can definitely be labeled a huge success!



Dear Ed:

I am a new Hobie 10 owner, and I think it is a very exciting 10-foot boat. Yes, it is a beginners' boat, but I have been sailing for four years now and find my Hobie 10 more exciting every day — especially when I get her in a good blow! Keep up the Hobie tradition!

Dear Ed:

We Hobie 16 sailors in Ocean City, N.J. have developed a sure-fire way to right a Hobie 16 that costs less than \$5.00 and works — Honest! The extra weight needed for one man to right a Hobie 16 that's flipped is right under the boat: water! The only equipment needed is a plastic or nylon bag capable of holding approximately 4 or 5 gallons of water (without bursting). The plastic must be over 5 mil thickness, or heavier. The overall size of the bag is approximately 30x48 inches.

And here is how it works...Sit on the low hull and fill the bag with water, leaving enough twisted neck on the bag to entwine and knot to a high righting line. (Elevate bag as much as possible while knotting same to righting line.) Now assume a squat position (facing trampoline) with the righting line coming over one shoulder. Lean back and out, straightening your legs to elevate the bag of water (as you would normally to right a Hobie 16). The filled bag will come up and rest against your back as you lean out. (Body acts as a leaver to elevate the bag.) The weight is there — and up pops the ol' mast! Catch the mast support bar under the trampoline to prevent a re-flip.

The plastic or nylon bag can be re-used time and again and stores conveniently tied to the trampoline. There's no sweat — and practically no expense — involved. This device will give the solo sailer back his freedom and independence. Try it . . . you'll like it!

Sunday, I spent most of the day practicing inverted flight — my record is about four seconds until the nose would drop, and I've have to pull it out. There are a few guys at Salt Creek (in Dana Point, Ca.) who can fly inverted for maybe ten seconds or more on a good windy day. I'll tell you, Van, this R/C Hawk is the greatest thing I've gotten into since surfing and skiing, and I enjoy it just as much or more!!



The 1975 Midwinter's West will be held February 7th, 8th and 9th in San Felipe, Baja California, Mexico. San Felipe, a quaint little town boasting a unique "Mexican village" atmosphere, lies approximately 120 miles below the California border on the beautiful Sea of Cortez; its sheltered bay, sundrenched sandy beaches and a pleasant winter weather add to the attractiveness of the area. For the window shoppers and bargain hunters, San Felipe has many curio stores offering arts and crafts objects, Mexican wearing apparel, furniture and souvenirs

As many of you know, the Midwinter's West have "traditionally" been held in Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico (on the opposite side of the Gulf and farther south), but we think you'll find San Felipe to be a fantastic regatta location also. The road leading to San Felipe is paved, well-kept, and is easily traveled by any type of vehicle. And San Felipe, being only a 7-hour drive from the Los Angeles area, will hopefully attract those of

you who, in the past, have been unable to make the long drive to Guaymas.

There are excellent accommodations in San Felipe: the El Cortez Motel and the Club de Pesca campgrounds. Both the motel and the campground (adjacent to each other) are right on the beach and offer complete facilities. All the rooms at the El Cortez are air-conditioned and their rates are very reasonable: \$9.00 a day for a room with one double bed and \$12.00 a day for a room with two double beds, with a \$1.00 charge per day for each extra person staying in the room. The Club de Pesca campground offers showers, electricity, and even a laundromat, for only \$2.00 -\$4.00 a day. Reservations for either a motel room or a camping site must be sent, along with a deposit. DIRECTLY to the motel or camp-

It looks like this year's Midwinter's West could be the best we've ever had. We're even adding a new event to the program — the first Hobie Hawk Soaring Contest. There's a giant sand dune hill overlooking the town that provides

excellent flying conditions, so those of you who got Hobie Hawks for Christmas better bring them along! The contest will be on Friday, February 7th; the competition will be divided into three groups (beginners, intermediate, and advanced) ... and don't worry about competing against Hobie ... we'll put him in his very own class!

The February weather in San Felipe is usually nice and warm, but it can get a little nippy if you're out sailing all day, so be sure to bring a wet suit along. Also, be prepared for some of the most radical tide changes you've ever seen — when the tide goes out in the bay, it REALLY goes out! On the 8th and 9th, however, high tide will be at 12:00 noon and low tide will be at 7:00 p.m., so we shouldn't have any trouble getting the boats in and out of the water.

Saturday night we'll have a super dinner and party for everyone at the El Cortez Motel. The dinner will be free to all contestants, with additional tickets on sale during the registration.





A Leeward Close-hauled Boat Rates Room To Tack At Obstructions

HAILED BOAT'S RESPONSE

OPTION:

Tack at once

Often we see boats forfeit racing positions because their skippers don't really understand this rule.

You remember from lesson No. 6 (''buoy room'') that marks and obstructions give rights to inside overlapped boats, but provide limited tacking rights.

ref: rule 42

Specifically, under rule 42, you may not tack close in front of boats, and when overlapped may tack only when that's "...an integral part of the rounding or passing maneuver." And, you had to overlap two lengths away to get rights under rule 42 (or, have tacked into the overlap).

> ref: rule 42.2 ref: rule 42.1 ref: rule 42.3

Rule 43, however, provides protection against being forced to run into things. It applies only to close-hauled leeward or leading boats - presumably, there's a simpler way out for boats that are not close-hauled — and says they can always force the other fellow to give them sea room to tack and clear the obstruction.

WHEN CAN YOU HAIL for room to tack?

When both boats are on the same tack, are close-hauled, and you're ahead or leeward, AND you can't an obstruction substantially altering course.

WHAT OBLIGATIONS go with hailing?

You musn't tack at the same time you hail; you must tack as soon as the hailed boat tacks — or, if not possible, as soon thereafter as is possible.

WHAT MUST the hailed boat do?

- She can tack.
 She can hail "you tack."
 She can, IF the obstruction is a mark, hail "no, I can fetch it."

Note carefully: if the hailed boat takes any of the alternatives to tacking, she assumes dire risks:

- If she hails "you tack," she assumes full responsibility for keeping clear
- while you do so; or If she hails "I fetch" for a mark she will be disqualified if she later fails to fetch it.

(Sorry, lady. To "fetch" means to get there on the tack you're now on, passing on the required side, without further tacks.)

WHAT IF I'M really in danger because she says "no, I fetch?"

You may hail again, "tack anyway, sea room!", whereupon she MUST tack, and you MUST withdraw — the race is over for you.

ref: rule 43.3

Fine print point: if the obstruction is a "continuing" one, such as shoals or anchored boats, you must not establish a new overlap between the windward boat and the obstruction except at your own risk; if you did so establish overlap near the obstruction, you could still hail for room, but could be disqualified after you got it under rule 42.3 which says don't be so dumb.

Conclusions: when large things you must miss get in your way, you can make your neighbors give you room to miss them. Between rules 42 and 43, you can generally choose which side to go, when there is a reasonable choice. If going one way would make you lose more time than your neighbor, consider hailing him to tack, so you both have to make the same maneuvers.

Hobie hulls fly . . . and fly . . . and fly

The Third Annual Hobie Cat Hull Flying Contest, held at Marianas Yacht Club on Apra Harbor in Agana, Guam, Sunday, December 15th, was a huge success with two world's records established! *

The object of the Hull Flying Contest is to see which skipper can sail his catamaran balancing with one hull completely clear of the water surface for the longest period of time. A chase boat follows each contestant with timers to record the exact time the windward hull leaves the water and reenters. Each contestant has a five minute period in which to make his run. If he is still flying a hull at the end of this period the timing continues until the hull reenters the water. Only the competitors' longest run counts.

In the Hobie Cat 14 class all four entries bettered the listed world record of 27 seconds, held by Scott Daniel whose firm, Paradise Safari, sponsored the local event. The results are: 1st - Mark Wolfe (3:36); 2nd - Eric Jonsson (1:30); 3rd - Scott Daniel (1:14); 4th - Bruce Kueffner (0:44).

In the Hobie Cat 16 class Phil Drips won for the second year with a world record time of 4 min. 34 sec., sailing single-handed. Phil won the first year's contest sailing a Hobie Cat 14, but the times were an average of three trials that year so are not counted for records. Phil's time last year was 2 min. 35 sec., but that record was broken on July 6, 1974 by Tim Buse of Hobie Fleet #60 with his time of 3 min. 43 sec. at the annual Thunder Bay Regatta in Alpena, Michigan. Now Phil has brought the record back to Guam for a while, at least. The wind varied from 10 to 15 knots with gusts up to 20 part of the time. The expert timing and recording team of V. Furlow, Lee Campbell, and Ed Hanley operated from the MYC's 'Zodiac', while other contestants, families, and friends watched from aboard the 51-foot ketch, 'Good Friends', which was anchored in the area of the course where refreshments were available courtesy of Paradise Safari.

*"Records" are claimed simply because we have no knowledge of other organized attempts, with the exception of the Alpena, Michigan contest noted in the September '74 Hot Line.









First Woman on the "Pumpkin Plaque"



Marjorie not only won handily on elapsed time, but also took first on corrected time.

1974 marks the first time a female has ever had her name inscribed on the Pumpkin Plaque since it was put up for annual competition some eight years ago. So, Pat Hastings, in southwestern Ontario women not only *crew* on Hobie 16's . . . they *skipper* winning 14's!!



1975 Nationals Qualification System

By Rich Jeffries, National Race Coordinator

Last year we introduced a new points system for qualifying to the Nationals which proved to be both fair and accurate. As with any new system. however, there were some bumpy spots which had to be overcome. The system was designed to give all skippers, regardless of their geographical locations, an opportunity to qualify.

Evaluation of the system pointed out that no skipper qualified on fleet regattas alone. With the system based on a percentage of the number of entrants, only 2 or 3 fleets had an adequate enough number of members to earn the necessary points required. We also noted that, with only the skipper's best 5 scores counting, occasionally a skipper would use 2 of his fleet series scores to count. Coupled with this was the problem of getting

either the fleets or the regatta sponsors to forward results immediately after each regatta to the Divisional Captains, causing many headaches for the Divisional Captains when this wasn't done. Others neglected to submit their results to the Hobie Class Association for publication in the HOT LINE, assuming that it was the responsibility of the Divisional Captain to do this.

This year, we are going to make a few changes, hopefully to eliminate these problems. First of all, only certain designated regattas will be considered Points Regattas for qualifying to the Nationals. Last year the points were based on a percentage of the total number of entrants within each class: 10'; 12'; 14' or 16'. This year, a skipper will earn a set number of points for the regatta, regardless of the number of entrants. The deadline for

points accumulation is September 1. 1975, and the established points system is as follows:



We are also trying to eliminate the scorekeeping problems encountered last year and, by utilizing this system, we will not need the Divisional Captains as such. We will need these individuals and others like them to be our contacts in the field who have proven to be of invaluable assistance in helping us keep tabs on what is taking place in his division. This year, all scores must be submitted directly to the Hobie Class Association where a running total will be kept and made available to all of you upon request.

We are very enthusiastic about this system and are just as confident that it will work.

You will note that we are qualifying more people to the Nationals thru Divisional Championships. This will enable a skipper to qualify to the Nationals if he found it difficult to travel to points regattas throughout the year.

If a skipper qualifies thru both Points and Divisional Championships, he will be considered a "Points Qualifier" and the next skipper in line from the Divisional Championships will be considered that division's championship qualifier.

Points regattas will be designated as such in the HOT LINE and will, when possible, be accompanied by a flyer. These regattas, numbering a maximum of 12 and a minimum of 5 for each division, will be chosen by the Hobie Class Association after consultation with representatives of the divisions. It is therefore necessary that your entire regatta schedule for 1975 be sub-


mitted to us immediately, indicating which events you feel would warrant being considered points regattas. After all are heard from (DEADLINE DATE: MARCH 1), selection of points races will be based upon items such as geographical location (attempting to spread them out throughout the division), variety of sponsors (different fleets and dealers), and, of course, the potential success of that regatta.

If a division holds 5 points regattas, the best 3 will count for the 1975 points; the best 4 of 6 or 7 points events will count; the best 5 of 8 or 9 points races, and the best 6 of 10 to 12.

Last year, we allowed a skipper to travel outside his division, earn points, and return with them to the division in which he lived. This year, all points will remain within the division raced, meaning that, if a skipper living near the borders of Divisions 6, 8 and 9, for example, travels to those divisions during the year, he has an opportunity to qualify in all of those divisions. He would thereby have earned three separate sets of points. For the sake of Divisional Championships, a skipper's home division will be considered that division in which he has raced most often throughout the year. Likewise, a skipper can race in any divisional championship and be eligible for any prizes earned in the event, but can only qualify to the Nationals thru his "home" divisional championships.


